These questions, when put together in a paragraph, are the way our GCSE students analyse their chosen artist's work; they form their own opinion.




YOUR TASK.

Thinking task:

How many numbers can you see in these works by the artist Jasper Johns? The painting and the drawings have the same numbers.






 On a piece of A5 paper, draw a 10cm x 15cm box. Must use: A ruler and a pencil.
Then get it photocopied!
On the copy, use shading in different areas to abstract* the image. When this is completed, the shading should increase the difficulty for people to see what it is, when you see the numbers in a line - 1, 2, & 3 - it is easy to 'read'. When you change things to look differently or people cannot tell what it is, you have created abstraction.
On the original, paint the image with a variety of colours within a 'range' i.e. complimentary, analogous, triadic etc. You could end up being TOO close.

4. Try another one but this time, just your name.

Compare your work with the work of Jasper Johns. Analyse your successes and areas for improvement use key words and phrases learnt from this topic so far.
