








Is Religion good or bad?

Why are miracles important?

Differences and Similarities in the Birth Narratives

Matthew's Gospel tells the story from Joseph's point of view and shows Jesus as a King. It includes the Wise Men who bring gifts, showing that Jesus is important. King Herod becomes jealous and orders all baby boys in Bethlehem to be killed. To stay safe, Joseph, Mary, and Bethlehem, escape to Egypt, which Matthew says was part of God's plan.

Luke's Gospel, however, focuses on Mary's point of view and shows Jesus as a saviour for everyone, including ordinary people. The Angel Gabriel visits Mary to tell her she will give birth to Jesus. Mary and Joseph travel to Bethlehem for a census, and Jesus is born in a stable, placed in a manger. Instead of Wise Men, shepherds visit Jesus, showing that his message is for all people, not just the rich or powerful.

Both Matthew and Luke say that Jesus was born in Bethlehem, and that Mary was a virgin, showing that his birth was special. Both say that Jesus is the Son of God, sent to save people. Angels appear in both stories to announce his birth. Matthew includes the Wise Men, King Herod's massacre, and the family's escape to Egypt, while Luke includes the Angel Gabriel's message, the journey to Bethlehem, and the visit of the shepherds. Matthew presents Jesus as a King, while Luke shows him as humble and close to ordinary people.



The Miracle of Feeding the 5,000
