On Thursday 22nd January, Cowley welcomed Ed Miliband, Secretary of State for Energy Security and Net Zero, who visited the school to hear about our commitment to sustainability and reducing energy costs through the installation of Great British Energy solar panels.

The visit was also attended by Councillor Anthony Burns, Councillor David Baines, and Liverpool City Region Mayor, Steve Rotherham.

Cowley is one of a number of schools to be named to have panels installed in efforts to cut bills, reduce carbon emissions and invest in a more sustainable future for their students and the community.

During his visit, Ed met with members of the school's Eco

Club, taking time to listen to the issues that matter most to them. Students spoke passionately about sustainability and shared their recent experiences in attending the local Junior Climate Change Day at the Town Hall.

Ed toured the school, visiting classrooms while lessons were underway.

The Eco Club students were later interviewed by ITV, helping to highlight the importance of young people's involvement in conversations about climate change and the future of energy.



A Y8 student proudly represented our school at a special event held at the Town Hall, celebrating the power and importance of oracy.

The local authority invited schools across the borough to take part in a competition, and we were delighted when one of our students was selected to attend.

Chosen by Mr Robinson, Library and Resource Centre Manager, the student impressed judges with an exceptional piece of writing exploring creativity and how it can be expressed in all aspects of life.

Her work stood out for its originality, insight and confidence.

At the ceremony, she was the only student whose writing was read aloud, an honour made even more special as it was shared by award-winning author and screenwriter Frank Cottrell-Boyce himself.

Holocaust Memorial Day



Held annually on 27th January, Holocaust Memorial Day falls on the anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp where more than a million people died during the Second World War.

The Holocaust is central to Holocaust Memorial Day when we remember the six million Jewish men, women and children who were murdered.

On Memorial Day, Sam Neumann (Northern Holocaust Education Group) attended Cowley to share the story passed down from his mother, Bobby, who as a Jewish teenager in Nazi Germany allied Hungary, was deported to Auschwitz concentration camp in 1944 – a terror she endured and survived. Sam presented to our Y9 students.

To mark Holocaust Memorial Day on 27th January, we also reflected on the recent MFL trip taken by a group of Year 11 pupils to Munich and Salzburg.

As part of this visit, pupils took part in an educational guided tour of Dachau concentration camp, located just north of Munich.

The visit was deeply sombre, yet incredibly informative, helping pupils to understand how and why the Holocaust began and how it expanded throughout the 1930s and 1940s.

Dachau, established in 1933, was the first concentration camp created in Nazi Germany, several years before the outbreak of the Second World War in 1939.

During the tour, pupils heard powerful testimonies about prisoners of all backgrounds, nationalities and ages.

The Year 11 pupils conducted themselves with maturity, respect and attentiveness throughout the visit and were a real credit to the school.

A sign displayed in one of the Auschwitz exhibitions reads, "Those who do not remember the past are condemned to repeat it" (George Santayana).

As time passes and the number of living witnesses continues to diminish, this message feels more poignant than ever.

On Holocaust Memorial Day, we encouraged our school community to pause and remember the six and a half million innocent people who lost their lives in the Holocaust across Europe, including a small number from the UK armed forces and the Channel Islands.


Presentation Evening

Cowley Sixth Form College recently welcomed a visitor from the Wigan Athletic Community Trust to deliver an engaging and informative talk to our Year 12 BTEC Sport students, focusing on the exciting Higher Education pathways available within the sports industry.

The session introduced students to two fantastic progression routes: the Foundation Degree in Community Football Coaching and Development and the Foundation Degree in Sports Coaching and Development, both delivered in partnership with the University of South Wales.

Students gained valuable insight into the structure of the courses, entry requirements, assessment methods, and the wide range of career opportunities they can lead to, from coaching and community development roles to sports performance, education and leadership careers.

The talk also highlighted the strong emphasis on practical experience, employability and real-world application, giving students a clear picture of how these programmes support their long-term ambitions. Our students were highly engaged throughout, asking thoughtful questions and showing real enthusiasm for the pathways on offer.
